


2024 UW Legislative Agenda: Expand Dental Education in Rural WA

The UW School of Dentistry Regional Initiatives in Dental Education (RIDE) program aims to develop dentists who are committed to practicing in Washington's rural and underserved communities. The innovative training model immerses students in community-based clinics to gain valuable field experience while also providing high quality dental care to areas with access to care challenges. In the classroom, RIDE is co-located with Eastern Washington University's dental hygiene program to maximize resources and enhance training.

RIDE has proven successful with more than 80% of graduates returning to rural and underserved communities in Washington and the region, with 48% of RIDE alumni currently practicing in Eastern or Central Washington. This is notable given the national rate of DDS graduates practicing in these communities hovers below 10%.

Currently, RIDE students spend their first year of dental school at EWU in Spokane and complete two clinical rotations at Community Health Centers in central and eastern Washington. To meet rising demand from students and local communities, the UW requests \$2.5M in FY25 (ongoing) to enhance the RIDE program by increasing the number of DDS students trained from 32 to 64, adding a second year of curriculum to the educational program in Spokane by securing centralized space that supports a Regional Simulation Training lab and interprofessional programming.

Notably, the UW has already secured \$1.5M in federal funds for dental simulation equipment for RIDE and EWU dental hygiene students.
